




30 Have all the gifts of healing? do all speak with tongues? do all interpret?

- Robert Nicholas was born in the Canadian Province of state of Ontario in 1882. He was the eldest son of eight children. His parents farmed outside of the small town of Caledonia.
- Robert's parents were hard working farmers. Robert learned the blessings of hard work and the value of money at their feet.
- This is also where he met his Savior. Both his parents had a deep and abiding faith in the Christ. They did everything in their power to see each of their children come to him.
 - They also had a reputation of benevolence. The farming and ranching life comes with built in challenges. The Nicholas family lived out their faith in how they treated others. It made no difference. Beloved friend, next door neighbor or just a new acquaintance, they were always ready to lend a had of help.










- Robert had apprenticed as a clerk in a hardware store but there did not seem to be many opportunities on the farm or in his small town. He remembered a statement his uncle had said many years before after attending the the Chicago Columbian World's Fair in 1883. As he was talking to Robert's Mom his uncle said, "There are a hundred ways to make a living in Chicago."
- This was the motivation that Robert had to move to Chicago and see for himself. Robert and his cousin both got a position at a large hardware store in Chicago. They worked eight hours a day, six days a week and each earned a dollar-a-day.
- Once learning of exorbitant wages, he was receiving, Robert's father wrote him a long letter on his Christian responsibilities such as stewardship, tithing, and benevolence.



1909 - 1914

- Robert and His cousin were active in church and the Epworth League. First as young adults and then as leaders.
- They bowered some money and purchased a hardware store of their own in a small town west of Chicago called Oak Park. It wasn't much, but they saw what it could become. In a short time, the Nicholas hardware store earned a sterling reputation for quality, service and fair prices.
- Robert's ministry to the youth of Chicago lead him to meet his future bride, Amy Ellison. They were married on June 24th, 1909. They would go on to have two sons and daughter. Robert, Thomas, and Dorthy.
- In 1914 he would be called to aid one of his sisters due to her husband being away fighting in France. God had greater plans!



1915 - 1950


- It was obvious that something about Robert had changed. It wasn't business first and his faith second. It was just the opposite.
- He was led to sell his profitable hardware business and start a Savings and Loan Association to help people buy and build homes.
- During the great Depression not one of his home loans went into default.




