



dusenteria (doos-en-ter-ee'-ah); from NT:1418 and a comparative of NT:1787 (meaning a bowel); a "dysentery": KJV - bloody flux.



dus- (doos); used only in composition as a prefix; hard, i.e. with difficulty:

KJV - hard, grievous, etc.

NT:1787 entos (en-tos'); inside (adverb or noun): KJV - within.

time (tee-may'); a value, i.e. money paid, or (concretely and collectively) valuables; by analogy, esteem (especially of the highest degree), or the dignity itself:

Honoured

KJV - honour, precious, price, some.

NT:5091

timao (tim-ah'-o); to prize, i.e. fix a valuation upon; by implication, to revere:

Honours

KJV - honour, value.










Garum




ROMAN FISH SAUCE Graum was a salty sauce Grade from fish, and it had a strong odor. The Romans enjoyed it with much of their food. In Pompeii, garum of the highest quality was made by a man named Umbricius Scaurus. It was expensive and was sold in small clay containers (right). A mosaic in Scaurus's house shows one of these containers inscribed with his name (below).
